SAINT JOHN THE EVANGELIST


Saint John the Evangelist (ca. 15 AD-ca. 100 AD), also known as St. John the Apostle, St. John of Patmos, and the Beloved Disciple, is one of the two Holy Saints John of Jerusalem Freemasons acknowledge as their Patron Saint. His Feast Day is December 27th, and his iconography is the eagle, pen and book. He is also known by some as St. John the Presbyter and St. John the Divine, although they might not have been the same man.

For Freemasonry, the Feast of St. John the Evangelist was utilized by many of the early Grand Lodges in England and Scotland as well as individual lodges. The Lodge of Edinburgh was associated with... St. John the Evangelist in St. Giles Cathedral as far back as the 15th century. The Grand Lodge of All England, which was a Masonic body located primarily in the city of York, as well as its predecessor the Ancient Society of Freemasons in the City of York, elected its President and, starting in 1725, its Grand Master on

the Feast of St. John the Evangelist. The Ancient Grand Lodge of England also elected its Grand Master on the same day. When the Ancients and the Moderns merged in 1813 to become the United Grand Lodge of England it occurred on the Feast of St. John the Evangelist.

The placement of the holiday also marks the winter solstice, which is directly opposite Saint John the Baptist's day at the summer solstice in June making a notable completion in the cycle of the solar year. The actual dates are slightly off, but you get the symbolism. But why John the Evangelist, and what about him represents the counterbalance of John the Baptist, the opposite pillar of the point within the circle? For those who forget, the point within the circle is the Masonic symbol that all men are said to endeavor to emulate in their physical and spiritual being. It essentially is the balancing one's desires and passions in the pursuit of knowledge.



Saint John the Baptist, represented as the inverted pyramid, the Alchemical sign for water, representing the spiritual and emotional love. St. John the Evangelist, represented as the pyramid pointing up symbolizing fire that is the drive and will of action. When placed together, they symbolize the perfect balance of darkness and light, life and death, passion and constraint, will and emotion, winter and summer. Together both represent the interlocked star of Solomon, or the Square and Compass.

So, who was John the Evangelist? Known for several things he was most notably as the only disciple of Christ to not forsake Him in the hour of His Passion at the foot of the cross and he was the first to reach

the tomb; when he met the risen Lord at the lake of Tiberius, where he was the first to recognize Him. Also, he is attributed as the writer of the Epistles of John, and the book of Revelation. His feast day is said to have first been mentioned in the Sacramentary of Pope Adrian I near 772 A.D.

The Evangelist is also called the Apostle of Charity, which may be in part, his connection to Freemasonry. Or perhaps it is his unwavering resolve and purity for his love of the divine. The message to take from John the Evangelist is to "Apply thyself, therefore, to purity of heart, and thou shalt be like Saint John, a beloved disciple of Jesus, and shalt be filled with heavenly wisdom." The feast is little remembered today, except in passing by a few lodges that gather together to celebrate it. It was once a high feast day for Freemasonry because of its proximity to the holidays and the presence of lodge members being close to home. It gave them a festival to meet under to punctuate the closing of the year. Meeting like this though is something not so convenient in this modern day as everyone travels abroad for the holiday. I belong to just one such club who is actually meeting the night before the feast, where we will definitely venerate the meeting and its symbolic importance.

So, the days following Christmas, pause for a moment to reflect and remember the feast day of Saint John the Evangelist, that pillar on the opposite side of John the Baptist balancing that circumscribed point within a circle.

GREETINGS FROM THE HISTORIAN

On November 19, 2021, prior to the installation of the Truth Triangle No. 31 officers, the Jephtha Masonic Museum was the beneficiary of an impressive Masonic artifact - a set of five brilliant blue mugs and pitcher adorned with Masonic symbols and platinum banding, manufactured by Thomas Maddock & Sons of Trenton, New Jersey, and date to the early 20th century. They were donated by W∴ Dutch Heuser, Past Master and current Secretary of Wantagh-Morton Lodge No. 63. This impressive collection is only a small part



of several donations our dedicated Brother has bestowed on our fast-growing museum.

Thomas Maddock (1818-1899) was born in Burslem (Staffordshire, England) into a family of potters. He and his family came to New York City in 1847 where he established a china decorating shop, the first of its kind in the United States. He gained prominence as the designer of a White House dinner service for President Franklin Pierce.

Maddock also improved the old fashioned, early nineteenth century plumbing method of connecting lead pipe to a toilet by inventing a brass coupling replacement. His 1880 invention allowed the plumbing to be directly connected to the toilet, an innovation that was used for many years well into the 20th century. When "water closets" started making their way into homes, he formed a partnership in Trenton with his sons Charles, Archibald and Harry that produced another of his inventions, vitrified glass surface pottery toilets, then called "sanitary ware." Originally named Thomas Maddock and Sons, his sons renamed it Thomas Maddock's Sons Co. after their father's death in 1899. At one time Trenton led the nation in the production of sanitary ware. The company suffered hard times in the 1920s and was forced to sell to American Standard in 1929.

CONGRATULATIONS TO BR. THOMAS WAINWRIGHT

DeMolay International defines Br. Wainwright's honor as follows: "The Legion of Honor is the highest honor conferred by DeMolay International. It may be conferred upon a Senior DeMolay who has attained the age of twenty-five years for outstanding leadership in some field of endeavor, or for success in fraternal life, including adult service to the order. No one may apply for this distinction, and a nominee... must have no knowledge of the recommendation...."

Br. Wainwright was nominated for this award based on his exemplary and dedicated service to the Masonic Youth of Suffolk County, his long Masonic service as a Past Master of Alcyone Lodge, a member of Jephtha Lodge, as well as a past Patron of Adah Chapter, Order of Eastern Star. He is a Senior DeMolay who began his journey at the Walt Whitman Chapter which met at Huntington before moving to Nissequogue DeMolay in Smithtown. He previously received Past Master Councilor Meritorious ranking, the degree of Chevalier and served a term as Deputy Region Master Councilor of Suffolk under the former State Master Councilor William Sardone. He is a dedicated family man who has worked throughout his life to ensure Masonic values are paramount in the hearts and minds of his family. He has never sought nor desired the spotlight which makes this honor even more noteworthy.

His red cords and medallion were bestowed upon him during the ceremony by his daughters, Jennifer and Deborah, both of whom are active advisors and alumni of local Masonic Youth organizations, including Truth Triangle #31 which meets at Jephtha Lodge. Assisting in the knighting ceremony were his two grandsons, Tristan and Dillon, who are an active DeMolay and a DeMolay Squire, respectively. Tristan also served as Herald during the degree, announcing the start of the presentation. Witnessing the ceremony were his son-in-law, Brother Brian Schulbaum of Jephtha Lodge, and his granddaughter, Truth Triangle member Cadence. Br. MASONIC MOMENT

The Great Secret of Freemasonry

Recently I called at the home of a friend and found his wife reading a Masonic Paper. Since she and her

people had long been a bitter anti-Masonic family, I asked her the reason for her change in reading material. She replied she had discovered the grand secret of Masonry; and related to me (the original writer) as follows:

"Soon after you were here last, I learned to my mortification, my husband had become a Mason. I felt it was because of you and I need not say how I felt toward either of you. I at once decided that my domestic happiness had come to an end. Sometime later a circumstance occurred that for the first time gave me reason to doubt his integrity. Late on one of the coldest nights last winter my husband came in and asked, "Margaret, can you do without your blanket shawl?" I answered yes and he asked me to get it, also a bed comforter. I handed them to him and he left the house to join a friend who was waiting for him with a very large basket. My husband returned shortly with no explanation, either then or later for his actions. I decided to watch for my shawl, for if I once caught sight of it I could unravel this whole mystery. Soon afterward a female whisked past me on the street wearing my shawl.

"The good for nothing huzzy," I thought; and excitedly started in pursuit. I followed closely from street to street and into the fourth story of a bindery. As she sat down to work, I immediately set about locating her residence to get a clue to my husband's perfidy. On arriving at her home, I saw that I was not mistaken for I found my comforter there.

"The who secret flashed on my mind at once, as clearly as if it had been written with a sunbeam from heaven. There I found a widowed mother in the last stages of consumption, and three children dependent upon the scanty pittance earned by the elder sister, whom I had followed. 

FAMOUS DECEMBER MASON

Joseph Rudyard Kipling

December 30, 1865, Malabar Hill, Bombay, British India - January 18, 1936, Fitzrovia, London, England
Nobel Prize in Literature, 1907
Buried in Poet's Corner, Westminster Abbey, London, England

Rudyard Kipling, as he was known, was the son of John Lockwood Kipling and Alice MacDonald, one of four vivacious sisters. "Dullness and Mrs. Kipling cannot exist in the same room," said Lord Dufferin. His father was a sculptor and pottery designer, principal and professor of architectural sculpture at the Sir



Jamsetjee Jeejebhoy School of Art in Bombay. John and Alice loved Rudyard Lake (Staffordshire, England) where they courted and thus named their first child Rudyard.

Kipling was born in India and spoke Hindi before English thanks to his ayah (nanny) and considered himself an Anglo-Indian. When he was 5 and his sister 3, the children were sent to England to live with a couple that boarded children of British nationals living abroad. He was not happy with this family and recalled his stay with horror, cruelty and neglect. He and his sister did spend the Christmas holidays with a maternal aunt and her husband which they found "a paradise which I

verily believe saved me."

Realizing he would not get a scholarship to continue his studies at Oxford University and his parents didn't have the means to send him, he sailed for Bombay in 1882 at sixteen and a half years old where his father obtained a job for him as assistant editor of the local newspaper, *Civil and Military Gazette*, in Lahore. (His father was principal of the May College of Art and curator of the Lahore Museum.) Later, he worked for *The Pioneer* in Allahabad. At the newspaper, Kipling contributed short stories, and the paper became his "mistress and true love." His output of stories continued at a frenetic pace.

While in India, Kipling became a Freemason. After the paper had been put to bed in the sultry Indian midnight, he would find his way into the old walled city to sense the mystic atmosphere of that colourful land and its ancient people, and to exercise a talent for absorbing background and for storing in his memory impression and incidents which provided material for a half-century of literary production. In the bazaars, from all sorts of conditions of natives, from police officers, and from service people, he gathered copy that was to be the basis of many poems and stories. His biographer says that one of the channels by which he penetrated the underworld was Freemasonry - he was fascinated by the mysterious bond that over-came class rules. Freemasonry was a cult that transcended caste and sects. It was the only ground in a caste ridden country on which adherents of different religions could meet on the level. In his twenty-first year he began to produce the verse and stories that were to make him famous, and which attracted attention from the outset.

In "Something of Myself," Kipling writes: In 1885, I was made a Freemason by dispensation (being underage) in the Lodge of Hope and Perseverance 782 EC because the Lodge hoped for a good Secretary. They did not get him, but I helped, and got Father to advise me in decorating the bare walls of the Masonic Hall with hangings after the prescription of King Solomon's Temple. Here I met Muslims, Hindus, Sikhs, members of the Araya and Brahmo Samaj, a Jewish Tyler, who was a priest and butcher to his little community in the city. So, yet another world was opened to me which I needed. We get a little more detail in a letter Kipling wrote in the London Times, dated March 28, 1935: In reply to your letter, I was Secretary for some years of the Lodge of Hope and Perseverance No. 782, English Constitution which included Brethren of at least four different creeds. I was entered by a member of the Brahmo Samaj (a Hindu), passed by a Mohammedan, and raised by an Englishman. Our Tyler was an Indian Jew. We met, of course, on the level and the only difference that anyone would notice was that at our banquets some of the Brethren, who were debarred by caste rules from eating food not ceremoniously prepared, sat over empty plates. I had the good fortune to be able to arrange a series of informal lectures by Brethren of various faiths, on baptismal ceremonies of their religions.

There seems to have been some quality deep within his nature to which Freemasonry appealed. The idea of a secret bond, of a sense of community, and of high principles among men sworn to a common purpose, fitted his concept of a social order...

We find the reflection of Kipling's Masonic interest in three areas of his writing. There are wholly Masonic poems, of which "The Mother Lodge" and "Banquet Night" are largely familiar to Masons; there are the overtly Masonic-based stories such as "The Man Who Would Be King," "Kim," and those relating to the Lodge of Faith and Works, No. 5837, English Constitution, such as "In the Interests of the Brethren," "The Janeites," etc.; and there are the numerous Masonic allusions which colour many of his poems and stories...

Kipling seems ever-ready to insert, often in an incidental manner, Masonic allusions suggested by the ritual, terminology and symbols with which he was so intimately acquainted, and which had become embedded in his mind. The interested reader, who is persistent, will find more of such, often when least expected.

In 1889 Kipling had a dispute with *The Pioneer* and returned to England via the United States with stops in Rangoon, Singapore, Hong Kong and Japan. During his journeys in the United States, he met Mark Twain and was deeply impressed. Mark Twain's advice to Kipling as an author was "get your facts first and then you can distort 'em as much as you please." He lived in London where he met the American writer and publishing agent, Wolcott Balestier, and in 1882 Kipling married Balestier's sister, Carrie Balestier. They honeymooned in the United States and Japan, finally settling in Dummerston, Vermont at 707 Kipling Road, 3 miles north of Brattleboro. The house still stands today (named Naulakha, a National Historical Landmark), inspired by Mughal architecture. During his time in Vermont, he wrote *The Jungle Books* ("The Day's Work," "Captains Courageous"), a great deal of poetry (a volume entitled *The Seven Seas*), *Barrack-Room Ballads* which contained his poems "Mandalay" and "Gunga Din."

In 1896 Kipling, his wife and two daughters left Vermont for England. Anti-British sentiment in the United States and being threatened by his drunk brother-in-law caused their departure. They settled on the Devon Coast and a little time afterwards their son was born. Kipling had become a famous writer and he was finally, financially secure. During the winters he and his family would sail to South Africa and stay in a house on the Cecil Rhode estate.

In 1902 Kipling bought Bateman's House in rural Burwash (East Sussex, England) where he lived until his death in 1936. During his time at Bateman's House, his daughter Josephine died of pneumonia, and in her memory, he wrote *Just So Stories for Little Children*. In 1901 he was awarded the Nobel Prize in Literature, the first English-language recipient, and the youngest to ever do so at 42 years of age. The prize citation read, "In consideration of the power of observation, originality of imagination, virility of ideas and remarkable talent for narration which characterize the creations of this world-famous author." In 1915 his son, John, was killed in World War I for which he wrote the poem, "My Boy Jack." (There is some question if this poem is in honor of his son, or someone else, since John was never called Jack by his family.) His body was not positively identified until 1992; he is buried in St. Mary's Cemetery, Haisnes, France.

In response to John's death, Kipling became active in the Commonwealth War Graves Commission responsible for garden-like war graves throughout the world where British Empire troops are buried. Kipling's main contributions to the commission are literary: "Their Name Liveth for Evermore" on Stones of Remembrance in the large war cemeteries, and "Known Unto God" for gravestones of unidentified servicemen. He also chose the inscription "The Glorious Dead" on the cenotaph in Whitehall, London. He wrote a history of the Irish Guards, his son's regiment, and it is one of the finest examples of regimental history (1923).

Kipling died in 1936, and after his wife's death in 1939, their home, Bateman's House, was bequeathed to the National Trust. Today it is a museum dedicated to the author. (His only surviving child, a daughter,

died in 1976.)
