GREETINGS FROM THE EAST

My Dear Brothers,

Growing up believing, and still believing in Santa, it has come to my realization that he is indeed a Freemason

He threw 3 gold coins down the chimney which landed in their stockings hanging by the fireplace enabling them to be married. What differentiates this from my personal Santa experiences is the girls received gold in their stockings, I usually received coal.

This event is why St. Nicholas became the patron saint of children, followed by the tradition of every December 6th when Saint Nicholas would visit the children on a white horse and ask about how they behaved the previous year. All the children would leave a pair of shoes with a carrot and hay for St. Nicholas's horse. The good children would be rewarded with candy and small presents.

These aforementioned details were traditions bought over by Dutch Settlers. About 150 Years later, the poem "The Night Before Christmas," also known as "A Visit from St. Nicholas" by Clement Clarke Moore, was written. It tells of the legend Santa holds for us today, such as flying reindeer with names, all but the newest reindeer, Rudolph, who Robert L. May introduced in 1939.

FAMOUS DECEMBER MASON

FIORELLO ENRICO LA GUARDIA

December 11, 1882, New York City (Greenwich Village) - September 20, 1947, New York City (Bronx)



Fiorello Enrico La Guardia, who later changed his name to Fiorello Henry La Guardia, was the son of Italian immigrant Achille La Guardia, a non-practicing Catholic from Cerignola (Apulia), Italy, and Irene Luzzatto Coen, an observant Jewish native from Trieste, then part of the Austro-Hungarian Empire. The Luzzattos were a prestigious family of Jewish scholars, kabbalists, and poets. His parents married in Trieste, and La Guardia was raised an Episcopalian, a religion he practiced his entire life.

When Fiorello (Italian for Little Flower) was 8 years old the family moved to Prescott, Arizona, since his father was bandmaster at Fort Whipple. He attended grade school and high school in Arizona, moved to Trieste for a brief time with his family when he was 16, and graduated from the Dwight School in New York City, a private preparatory school on the Upper West Side.

In 1901 La Guardia joined the State Department and served in consulates in Budapest, Trieste and Fiume (today Rijeka in Croatia). Five years later he returned to New York City to attend New York University Law School (1907-1910) and worked as a certified interpreter in Italian, Yiddish, German and Croatian on Ellis Island to earn money. After quickly passing the bar, he began his own law practice in New York City.

La Guardia ran for Congress in 1914 (New York City's 14th district) and lost. He became Deputy Attorney General of New York in 1915. In 1916 he ran again for the same district and won, taking office in 1917, the first Italian American elected to the United States House of Representatives. Soon afterwards he was commissioned in the US Army Air Service (forerunner of the US Air Force) at the beginning of World War I. He was discharged as a major having flown Ca.44 bombers on the Italian-Austrian front and was reelected to Congress in 1918. In 1919 La Guardia narrowly won election as President of the Board of Alderman in New York City forcing him to resign from Congress. In 1921 he ran for Mayor of New York City and lost, so he ran again for Congress as a Republican for East Harlem, a strong Italian community, and won. He was a strong reformer in Congress (anti-immigration quotas, supporting unions against anti-union activists, and passing the Norris-La Guardia act of 1932 allowing workers to join trade unions). He again ran for New York City mayor in 1929 and lost but finally won in 1933. He was determined to win this last time and did so by representing underrepresented communities, appealing to many cultural backgrounds and thought (Germans, Jews, Italians, Democrats and Socialists), and promised a more honest government, efficiency and inclusiveness. He served as the president of the United States Conference of Mayors, 1935-1945.

In his first 100 days as mayor (1934), he was able to restore the financial health of the city by breaking free of banker's control, employing the unemployed with federally funded work programs, ending corruption and racketeering, creating merit-based civil service replacing patronage with great success, and modernizing transportation and parks. He had the help of President Franklin Delano Roosevelt who gave him 20% of the Civil Works Administration budget which was established during the Great Depression to create manual-labor jobs for millions of unemployed workers. With the support of Robert Moses (urban planner) and Herbert Lehman (New York State Governor) he was able to upgrade decaying infrastructure.

La Guardia's success as mayor was his ability to make Jews, Germans, Italians and WASPS (White Anglo-

Saxon Protestants) work together. Although he was New York's first Italian American mayor, he was different from other Italian American New Yorkers. He was Episcopalian, grew up in Arizona, had a lapsed Catholic father and an observant Jewish mother, and spoke several languages. When La Guardia ran for Congress in 1922, his opponent accused him of being an anti-Semite. La Guardia responded in the newspaper by writing his rebuke in Yiddish and challenged his opponent to debate him in public in Yiddish. His Jewish opponent (Henry Frank) could not speak Yiddish and lost the election!

With the rise of Naziism in the 1930's, La Guardia was a staunch supporter of Jews in the United States and encouraged the boycott of German goods. He appointed judges who were ethnically and religiously diverse, most always with great success.

La Guardia also cleaned up crime in New York City, arresting mob boss Lucky Luciano who was given a 30-50 year sentence for his lucrative prostitution business. La Guardia felt these kinds of criminals were a negative stereotype of Italians and shamed the Italian community. He also destroyed Frank Costello's slot machine business. La Guardia rounded them up, placed them on a barge, and before journalists, had them dumped into the river. He also shut down offensive, burlesque theaters. The Lucky Luciano case was made into a movie, *Marked Woman*, starring Bette Davis and Humphrey Bogart (1937).

One of La Guardia's greatest achievements was restoring New York City's economy after the Great Depression (1929-1940). With the help of FDR and his many new agencies to create work for out of work workers, \$1.1 billion came into the city. With the additional help of Robert Moses, they built the West Side Highway, East River Drive, Triborough Bridge, Brooklyn Battery Tunnel, La Guardia and Idlewild Airports, the latter becoming JFK Airport. He fought to preserve the Mecca Temple (55th Street) from demolition, a former Ancient Arabic Order of Nobles of the Mystic Shrine (Shriners) lodge and converted it to the New York City Center of Music and Dance. It still stands today and has state and federal landmark status. At its inauguration in 1943, the New York Philharmonic played with La Guardia conducting the Star Spangled Banner.

1939 brought the New York World's Fair to Queens, La Guardia Airport opened, and two subway systems were bought out which completed New York City's takeover of the entire subway system.

As World War II was becoming a reality, FDR appointed La Guardia as the first director of the new Office of Civilian Defense (OCD) which was to prepare for blackouts, train air raid wardens, install sirens, and build shelters in case of German air raids. FDR appointed his wife, Eleanor Roosevelt, as his assistant. La Guardia was still mayor of New York, and every week would spend 4 days in New York and 3 days in Washington, DC. The Brooklyn Navy Yard became the gateway for soldiers leaving for war along with building warships and manufacturing soldiers' uniforms.



His sister was married to a German. They lived in Hungary and were arrested by the Gestapo at the end of the war (1944). Her daughter, her husband and their infant son were also arrested. The husbands died in the concentration camps, but his sister, her daughter and her son survived. They were displaced persons in Europe after the war and arrived in the United States 2 years later. La Guardia died 4 months after his sister's arrival.

In 1945 La Guardia endeared himself to all the children in New York City during the newspaper strike. He read the Sunday funnies on the radio during the entire strike and had someone else read the dailies. He felt the children shouldn't be denied the funnies because of "a squabble among grown-ups."

La Guardia died at home in 1947 at 64 years of age and is buried in Woodlawn Cemetery (Bronx) with a very simple gravestone, *La Guardia, Statesman, Humanitarian*. He survived his first wife and daughter, both dying in 1926. He remarried in 1929 and adopted two children.

La Guardia is not only ranked as the greatest mayor of New York City, but the greatest mayor of any city in all of American history. As the 99th mayor, he served three consecutive terms (1933-1945) and is best remembered for obtaining a new city charter, fighting corrupt politicians and organized crime, improving the running of the police and fire departments, expanding social welfare services, clearing slums, creating low cost housing programs (Mayor Fiorello H La Guardia Houses on Manhattan's Lower East side, covering 10.67 acres and housing 2,596 residents) and improving and creating new city infrastructure, all the while remaining efficient and honest.

La Guardia has been honored with the following: La Guardia Airport, La Guardia Community College, Fiorello H. La Guardia High School of Music & Art and Performing Arts which he helped create as the High School of Music and Art (1936), La Guardia Street and La Guardia Interchange (Tel Aviv), a street in Rijeka, Croatia, where he had worked as a US Consular agent (1903-1906), a Broadway musical *Fiorello!*, and featured in several movies: *Ghostbusters II*, *The Plot Against America*, *In The Heights*, and an off-Broadway show, *Tammany Hall*. A Statue of La Guardia stands in La Guardia Gardens, Greenwich Village. The La Guardia and Wagner Archives at La Guardia Community College (Queens) were created to collect, preserve, and make available primary materials documenting the social and political history of New York City, with an emphasis on the mayoralty and the borough of Queens.

Fiorello La Guardia was a member of Garibaldi Lodge #542 in New York City, the first Italian speaking lodge in the United States, and he was a Scottish Rite Freemason. On Staten Island, there is a lodge named after him, La Guardia Lodge #1130.
