GREETINGS FROM THE CORNER DESK



By the time you read this, February 17th will be long past. As I write, however, it is just about to arrive. February 17th is one of the few days in the calendar that I observe with specific intent. It is the day that the Waldensian Church (With whom I worked when we lived in Italy.) and the Jewish Community in Italy celebrate their religious liberation – the anniversary of the 1848 declaration in which King Carlo Alberto finally granted them the legal freedom to worship. (Though, of course, other freedoms took much longer to be given.) It is also the day, in 1600, when the priests of the inquisition burned Giordano Bruno at the stake in Campo de' Fiori. A statue of Bruno, sculpted by the soon-to-be Grand Master

of the Grande Oriente d'Italia, stands in the middle of Piazza de' Fiori to commemorate the event and lend confidence to all who think outside the box and refuse to fall in line with the powerful institutions that seek to control us.

I do my best to visit that piazza every time I'm in Rome. Of course, Piazza de' Fiori is a life-filled, gritty centrum of food and protests and the location of a glorious openaired market today. My reason for visiting it, however, is slightly different. For me, standing at the foot of the dark and brooding statue of that ill-fated, Neapolitan philosopher/monk, I am reminded of the fact that he remained upright before his accusers and, as they condemned him to the only version of death that gives me nightmares, he is reported to have confidently responded, "Perhaps you who



pronounce my sentence are in greater fear than I who receive it."

Bruno is an ever-present reminder that we are called to become our best selves even when those around us cannot understand it, and while the consequences of their judgement can be extreme and unjust, the fear (and sometimes violence) out of which our condemners act should never prevent us from standing confidently as just and upright Masons ever committed to walking and acting as such.

GREETINGS FROM THE HISTORIAN

OBSERVANT MASONRY COMES TO NORTHPORT, LONG ISLAND, NEW YORK



Masonic Observance is by no means a new concept, but one which is gaining in recognition and popularity as a means of addressing core issues of membership participation and retention in the Craft. It requires a steadfast commitment of time and effort from Brothers who look to create a more profound Masonic experience within their Lodge. Observance begins with a uniformly shared ethos among the membership, which then manifests itself in the form of certain practices which have come to be associated with the Observant Masonry movement.

There are no alterations or innovations to the ritual itself, but rather a few noteworthy enhancements to the ambiance which create a deeper, more

impactful experience for members, visitors, and candidates. A partial list of these practices would include a more structured and formal dress code at meetings, the judicious inclusion of periods of sound (music) and silence (meditation), the use of incense, and subdued lighting including real candles where permitted. The aim is to create a sacred, meditative space where Masons can work their mystic art beyond the distractions and trappings of the profane world. The ritual itself is performed with precision from memory without the aid of the Masonic Standard. Candidates preparing for each degree meditate within a specially designed Chamber of Reflection to further prepare them for what follows. Periodic Festive Boards are encouraged as elegant affairs with formal toasts. All Masonic intercourse includes educational presentations with a focus on esoteric subjects. Lodges which apply for examination and are found to be regularly operating as such are granted permission to use the suffix "OM" for "Observant Masonry" after their Lodge name.

On Tuesday, February 7, 2023, an unprecedented event occurred where two bodies - a Masonic Lodge and a Royal Arch Chapter – were both officially certified as Observant Masonic organizations for the first time in history.



Freemasonry is no stranger to the sleepy village of Northport on the north coast of Long Island. Alcyone Lodge No. 695 has been meeting in the same building since the late 1870's, making it the longest continuously used Masonic building on Long Island. In the past year, Suwassett Chapter No. 195 of Royal Arch Masons moved into the Northport Temple, looking to join forces with the historic Lodge and create what was once thought an impossible dream. Together, these two

organizations pulled all their resources and met the overwhelming challenges of fiscal restructuring, building management, and creating a new foundation for a Masonic Temple dedicated to the Observant

On this day, Right Worshipful Piers Vaughan visited Northport for his personal examination and certification of the Lodge as an Observant Masonic organization. The Special Communication of Alcyone was followed by a joint Lodge and Chapter Agape, which was followed by a Convocation of Suwassett Chapter No. 195 R.A.M., where the Most Excellent Jason Sheridan, Grand High Priest of Royal Arch Masons in New York, assessed the Chapter for certification of Capitular Masonic Observance.

"It was a truly phenomenal evening with a complex array of events which would have normally occurred over the course of *three* evenings," says W∴ Bradley Hubbard, Master of Alcyone No. 695 and High Priest of Suwassett 195. "Our dedicated team of Brothers and Companions accomplished this with no loss of fidelity."

The honored guests determined that both Lodge and Chapter are indeed operating as Observant Masonic organizations, marking it a milestone event in the history of American Freemasonry. Suwassett, having pioneered the concept of Masonic Observance in the Capitular setting over the past several years, is now the first officially recognized Observant Chapter in New York. As New York is the pioneer jurisdiction for the Capitular Observance movement, one could say, that by extension, they have become the first in the world.

"Although many other Observant Lodges are currently in operation and there will surely be more Observant Chapters to follow," continues W.: Hubbard, "in no other setting have the two come together to offer the possibility of a "complete" experience from the first to seventh degrees. Alcyone Lodge and Suwassett Chapter have modeled a seamless integration of Lodge and Chapter, closely mirroring the English model within the boundaries of our jurisdictional requirements. This has all happened under one roof for the first time in known record." (Photo right: W.: Bradley Hubbard [on left] and V.: W.: Charlie Scheu [on right])



What does this mean for the Northport Lodge? "Well, in once sense *nothing* and another sense *everything*," W.: Hubbard replies. "*Nothing* insofar as we were adjudicated based on a core ethos which has manifested itself in all that we have done over the past year. We did not "*put on a one night show for them*" but "*put who we are on show for one night*". In that regard, nothing has changed from last week to this week. At the same time this changes everything, as we are charged to not only sustain that progress but improve upon it at every opportunity and, by extension, improve upon ourselves. There is no room for resting on our laurels as the laurels themselves are illusory. We have offered ourselves to the Craft not only as an example of Masonic Observance but as a practical resource to all who may endeavor to follow this path."

"Earning this distinction has labeled us, both literally and metaphorically. While we now officially bear the designation "Observant Masonry," the title is little more than an indicator. The beacon has been lit, and the true Seekers will continue to gravitate towards its brilliant glow in search of a more profound Masonic experience. It is incumbent upon us to keep it burning with intensity and remain steadfast on the course we've laid out."

FAMOUS MASON

DUKE ELLINGTON

Music! To be without a perception of the charms of Music is to be without the finer traits of humanity. In the middle chamber lecture we learn that music is the medium that gives the *natural world* communication with the *spiritual*. It is a language of delightful sensations, far more eloquent than words. Most of us have at one time or another heard a song that immediately transports us back, in great detail, to a person or event that we thought to be long forgotten. Such is the power of music. It has a voice for every age, a



capacity for every degree of taste and can be enjoyed by everyone.

Mood Indigo was one of Duke Ellington's most popular songs of the day. But this is only one of more than 3000 songs that he composed during his lifetime. Some of his best known other titles include "It Don't Mean a Thing (If It Ain't Got That Swing)", "Sophisticated Lady" and "Satin Doll".

Edward Kennedy Ellington was born on April 29, 1899, to James Edward Ellington and Daisy Kennedy Ellington. Daisy

surrounded her son with dignified women to reinforce his manners and teach him to live elegantly. Ellington's childhood friends noticed that "his casual, offhand manner, his easy grace, and his dapper dress gave him the bearing of a young nobleman" and began calling him Duke. The name stuck.

At the age of seven, Ellington began taking piano lessons. In the summer of 1914, while working as a soda jerk at the Poodle Dog Cafe, he wrote his first composition, "Soda Fountain Rag," also known as the "Poodle Dog Rag." Ellington created "Soda Fountain Rag" by ear because he had not yet learned to read and write music.

In his autobiography, *Music is my Mistress*, Ellington said he missed more lessons than he attended, feeling at the time that playing the piano was not his talent. Then, at the age of 14, Ellington started sneaking into Frank Holiday's Poolroom. Hearing the poolroom pianists play ignited Ellington's love for the instrument and he began to take his piano studies seriously.

From 1917 through 1919, Ellington launched his musical career. At first, he played in other ensembles. Then in late 1917 he formed his first group, "The Duke's Serenaders." His first play date was at the True Reformer's Hall, where he took home 75 cents. Soon Ellington played throughout the Washington, D.C. area and into Virginia for private society balls and embassy parties. The band thrived, performing for both African-American and white audiences, a rarity during those racially divided times.

First known for his distinctive "jungle" sound — a description derived from the use of growling muted brass and sinister harmonies — Ellington increasingly integrated blues elements into his music. Although he was a gifted piano player, his orchestra was his principal instrument. He composed with the idiosyncratic sounds of his band members in mind. He often composed specifically for the style and skills of these individuals. Due to his inventive use of the orchestra, or big band, and thanks to his refined public manner and extraordinary charisma, he is generally considered to have elevated the perception of jazz to an artistic level on par with that of classical music. Still, he was once quoted as saying, "By and Large, JAZZ has always been like the kind of man you wouldn't want your daughter to associate with."

Duke Ellington actually called his music "American Music" rather than jazz.

Duke Ellington became one of the most influential artists in the history of recorded music and is largely recognized as one of the greatest figures in the history of jazz. His career spanned 50 years and included leading his orchestra, composing an inexhaustible songbook, scoring for movies, and world tours. In his career, he played over 20,000 performances in Europe, Latin America, the Middle East as well as Asia.

Duke Ellington received 13 Grammy Awards and was awarded the Grammy Lifetime Achievement Award in 1966. He is one of only five jazz musicians ever to have been featured on the cover of Time Magazine, and Stevie Wonder's pop hit "Sir Duke" is a tribute to Ellington. Even after his death he received a special award citation from the Pulitzer Prize Board in 1999.

Among Ellington's many honors and awards were honorary doctorates from Howard and Yale Universities, membership in the American Institute of Arts and Letters, and election as the first jazz musician member of the Royal Music Academy in Stockholm. He received the US President's Gold Medal in 1966, the US Medal of Freedom in 1969, and the Legion of Honor from France in 1973, the highest civilian honors in each country.

A United States Commemorative stamp with his image on it was issued in 1986 and he appears on the reverse side of the District of Columbia quarter seated at a piano, sheet music in hand.

Edward Kennedy "Duke" Ellington was initiated in 1932 in Social Lodge No. 1 Washington DC, Prince Hall Affiliation. There is not much information available about his life as a Freemason, but it is said that his impressions of initiation were recorded in his song "I'm Beginning to See the Light."

Ellington lived for years in a townhouse on the corner of Manhattan's Riverside Drive and West 106th Street. After his death, West 106th Street was officially renamed Duke Ellington Boulevard. A large memorial to Ellington was dedicated in 1997 in New York's Central Park, near Fifth Avenue and 110th Street at an intersection named 'Duke Ellington Circle'.

He died of lung cancer and pneumonia on May 24, 1974, a month after his 75th birthday, and is buried in the Bronx, in New York City. At his funeral attended by over 12,000 people at the Cathedral of St. John the Divine, Ella Fitzgerald summed up the occasion, "It's a very sad day...A genius has passed."

The signature tune of the Duke Ellington orchestra is "Take the A Train." It is arguably the most famous of the many compositions to emerge from the collaboration of Ellington and Billy Strayhorn.


